

#### What you need to know (1/2)


- The rising cost of living, inflation and economic issues are all-consuming, though the NHS pushes into the top priorities. The cause of high prices is mostly global, but also by excessive-profit-taking by oil and other companies. But cost pressures dominate all else.
- The citing of profiteering is part of a strong anti-corporate thread. The public is hostile to CEOs of major companies and a growing proportion want to raise taxes on companies. Among the most popular policies is raising corporate taxes and putting a windfall profit tax on energy and oil companies and using the funds for households.
- One in five say climate change is the top problem, which falls with immigration and housing.
  However, a big, intense majority agree the climate crisis requires major action despite the
  cost. Big stable majorities want more measures to prevent climate change. CEOs gain
  standing when they say climate is a crisis and must change the way they do business.
- On industrial policy, half the public says the government should support the low-carbon sector, including new technologies, solar, wind and green hydrogen. The proportion prioritizing oil and gas dropped to 24 percent.
- The strategic landscape has changed with deep hostility to Russian and China. That impacts views on energy and the energy transition. The government gets high marks on providing military and financial aid to Ukraine, though much lower on applying sanctions or doing enough to replace Russian energy.

#### What you need to know (2/2)


- The public gives Russia and China the most negative ratings, then oil companies and the Extinction Rebellion. It has dragged down ratings of environmental groups. Nuclear gas companies are not as polarizing.
- Majorities oppose responding to the cut off of Russian energy with exploiting all domestic energy sources. They prefer to speed the transition to renewables that do not have to be imported from stable countries.
- The Prime Minister's overall approval and handling of climate change are above his vote, but well below his vote on the economy and prices for gas and power. The vision principles shortening NHS waiting lists, halving inflation and growing the economy get the highest support. The government energy policies that get the highest support are ones that have ended, changed or reduced in scale: £400 help with energy bills, extending the windfall profit tax, rewards to farmers to reduce risk and relaxing the ban on onshore wind.
- Labour's most popular policies include improving the NHS, making Britain a clean energy superpower and reforming police. Its most popular energy policies include freezing energy bills with windfall profit tax, crackdown on dumping, funds to insulate homes and establishing a Great British Energy, a new publicly-owned company as well as Labour's attack on not having a proper windfall tax and the cost of the on-shore ban.
- After hearing the priorities and policies of the government and Labour, the vote shifts further against the government.




### Cost of living and inflation, plus NHS top priorities, moving up are immigration; climate stable at one in five.



# For conservatives, climate with crime, for Labour, with economy and jobs, and Liberal Democrats, rises marginally to 36 percent




### For all generations, cost of living & energy prices, with surging worries about NHS.




### Among targets, cost of living, inflation, energy prices joined by the NHS with all targets





### Plurality found it difficult to heat their homes; more so among Red Wall seats


Difficulty heating home this winter, by target



### Majority in the UK say right for companies to factor in climate change in their investments






## High global prices and the war in Ukraine grow as top reasons for higher costs; excessive profits & Brexit also factors






Industries that government should support, by target

### Barely 30 percent see taxing burning of fossil fuels as "fair and efficient" way of changing to low-carbon




# Britons do not think enough is being done to punish Russia or to find new energy sources to replace Russian gas

Reactions to Britain response to war in Ukraine, total sample




Do you think the British government has done too much, too little, or about the right amount on each of the following?

### Big majorities for exploring in North Sea, but with little enthusiasm anywhere



# All target groups agree we need to hasten our transition to renewable energy — rather than all out exploration of domestic sources when including fracking





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


# Sunak's overall approval rating at 35% is above the Conservative vote; his handling of the economy and energy prices is well below

Reasons for disapproval, those who disapprove of government handling of climate




Why do you disapprove of how the government is addressing climate change, the environment and energy transition?







Opposition statements towards current government, total sample









### Freezing energy bills popular policy for all ages, Great British Energy most popular among young




#### Party messages opposing the government: full wording

Proper windfall tax	Labour says: The government is still letting fossil fuel companies make bumper profits. Labour would levy a proper windfall tax to tackle the cost-of-living crisis, because it is only right that companies making windfall profits from the proceeds of war pay their fair share.
On-shore ban cost £160	Labour says: The current ban on onshore wind has raised bills by £160 for every family because a few Conservative backbenchers don't like the way turbines look. Labour would lift the ban, cut bills, and give us more energy security.
Cancel April rise	The Liberal Democrats say: Oil companies are raking in huge profits from Putin's illegal invasion of Ukraine while families choose between eating and heating. Sunak has ignored calls for a proper windfall tax. He needs to cancel the energy bill rise in April.
Thirteen year of failure by Tories on energy	Labour says: It wasn't Putin's war that caused home insulation rates to collapse. It didn't cause a decade of inaction on nuclear and renewable energy. It didn't close British gas storage facilities. Those are the consequences of thirteen years of Tory failure on energy policy. And we are all paying the price.
Zero carbon cuts bills Tory cost profits	Labour says: With our plans for zero carbon by 2030, we can cut bills, enhance our energy security, create jobs, and tackle the climate crisis. The Tory delay is costing you money in higher bills, while subsidising massive profits for the oil and gas companies.
Prepay	The Green Party says: Rather than allowing energy companies to force more people on to pre-payment meters, the government should role out insulation to all households. This government is doing everything it can to ignore straightforward answers for this cost-of-living crisis.
Green paint economy	Labour says: The Climate transition isn't about putting a lick of green paint on a stagnant economy. It's about new jobs and new industries, lower bills, higher living standards, and economic growth. We know some country will lead on clean energy. Why not Britain?
Won't support our energy leaders	Labour says: From the world's biggest offshore wind farm near Yorkshire, to Rolls Royce developing carbon neutral aviation in Derby, to or our world-leading green hydrogen technology in Sheffield - the potential is there, but our government just complains from the sidelines.
On sidelines while US an EU act	Labour says: President Biden is powering ahead to fight for jobs in America. The EU is fighting for jobs there, but Britain under the Tories is getting left behind. With Great British Energy, our plan for a publicly owned energy company, we will make the jobs of the future here.

# Attacks on proper windfall tax, ban on onshore wind cost, ending April support and 13-years of inaction on energy had strongest impact


Political messages opposing the government's climate policy, total sample


Political messages opposing the government's climate policy, by target
